We Are the Same and yet We Are Different

This is the fourth annual report written since the first one in 2010. We are grateful to receive continuous support and blessing from members of our Honorary Overseas and Local Consultants.¹ The theme chosen for this report has two implications. First, our professional development journey is the same and yet is different from the experience in the Northern America. Second, Christian Chaplains are challenged to continue reflecting on how we are the same and yet different from other spiritual care providers.

To Pro-claim the Unique Identity of Christian Chaplains

In Hong Kong, when we describe someone is very “pro”, we mean that person has demonstrated a high level of professional quality. Does Christian identity have to be contradicted with excelling in professional ministry? In the past few years, we have continued to help local chaplains and church communities to reflect on the historical dialogue between “vocation” and “profession”. In addition to this challenge, facing with the increasing demand for multi-faith and faith-free spiritual care service, how do Christian chaplains claim the unique identity without compromising

either our faith tradition or the professional quality in clinical practice? Although Christian chaplains are still up to date the major spiritual care service provider in the “market” (i.e. hospitals), only by keeping our visibility, continuity, and high standard of practice can sustain the reliability of our professional ministry. The quality of Christianity then has to be demonstrated through our “being” prior to our “doing”.

To Enhance Chaplain Continuing Education (CCE)

Currently, CCE reporting scheme is still on a voluntary basis. There were 46 out of 93 registered chaplains submitted their CCE reports by the end of 2013. The Association continues to play a significant role in providing quality continuing education for local chaplains. The design of CCE

curriculum aims to provide a “balanced diet” that helps chaplains to enhance some of the required competences for chaplain certification, such as theological and theoretical integration, skills for clinical practice, as well as social awareness and communication. 2013 continuing education programs and participation are summarized as below:

To Promote Chaplain Registration and Certification

Registration in Hong Kong is still a voluntary scheme for hospital chaplains. By the end of 2013, there were 93 chaplains among 150 eligible applicants registered with the Association, including 17 Certified Chaplains, 49 Registered Chaplains I, 20 Registered Chaplains II, and 7 Auxiliary Chaplains, representing 62% of participation. The overall registration rate seems to reach a developmental

saturation. However, there were excitedly more chaplains participating in certification than last year. Following the first class (4 in 2012) of locally certified chaplains, a total of 10 eligible applicants joined the certification tutorial groups and 8 of them submitted their applications. Each applicant was then scheduled to be interviewed by a certification committee. Gratefully, all of them met the standards and were promoted to Certified Chaplains. Members of certification committee were pleased to witness their effort and harvest. Congratulations to each of them and blessings to the journey of local chaplain certification!

To Enrich CPE Program

Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) is an essence for the continuity of professional chaplaincy. The Association is so blessed to have staff and adjunct CPE supervisors to conduct Level I and II CPE programs in compliance with the ACPE standards throughout the year. In addition to single CPE unit in Spring, Summer and Fall, the Association has raised a sufficient fund to afford five stipend positions for the first class of 2013-14 year-long CPE residency. Five residents are placed in three major acute general hospitals. We believe that quality single units for pastors and seminarians will become a significant source of candidates for year-long residency.
